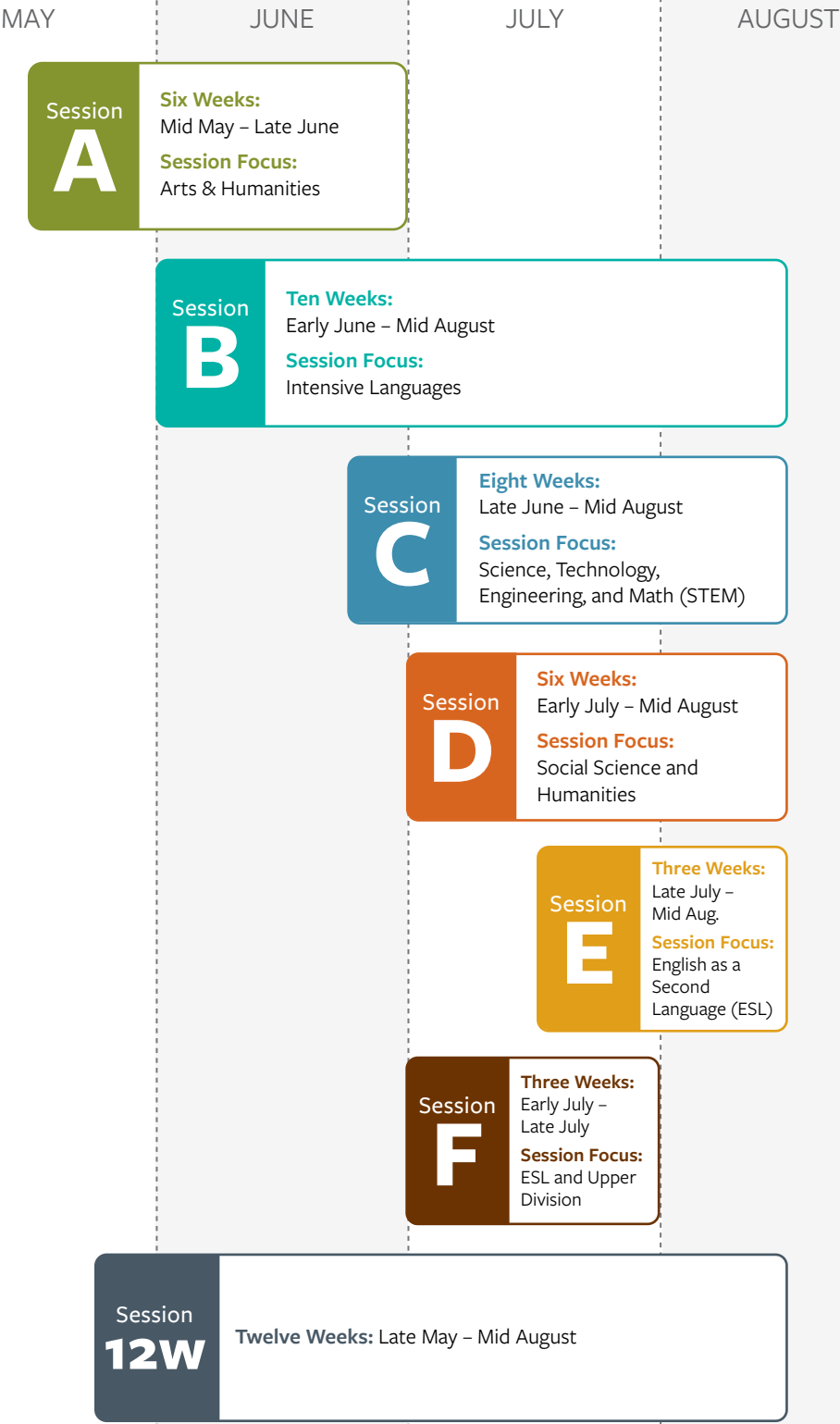

Academics

Accelerated instruction means that you will learn a semester's worth of material in just one summer. With continuous assessment, you are evaluated over the duration of the course through work such as exams, lab assignments, papers, and class participation.

Courses

Choose from undergraduate courses in more than 80 subjects, including engineering, social sciences, architecture, business, and more.

Courses are offered in three, six, eight, ten, or twelve week intensive sessions. All courses are university courses and are recorded on an official UC Berkeley transcript.

Classes are either offered in-person or as ‘Online’ and ‘Web-Based’. Courses that are coded as “In Person” will meet completely or primarily in person, and physical attendance on campus is expected.

Prerequisites

Many Summer Sessions courses have prerequisites which are indicated in the course description. If unsure whether you meet a prerequisite, contact the course department or instructor and be prepared to provide documentation of your previous coursework.

Enrollment

Enrollment for Summer Sessions opens in February. Visit summer.berkeley.edu/international for instructions for visiting international students.

Credit Transfer

Consult with your home institution regarding transfer of UC Berkeley coursework. Be prepared to provide course descriptions, syllabi, and other course information as required by your home institution.

Course Numbering

Each UC Berkeley course listing includes a number that indicates whether a course is undergraduate, graduate, or professional level. Use the chart below to determine the level of your course.

1-99 Open to first-year students and sophomores; not acceptable for upper division credit.	100-196 Ordinarily open to students who have completed at least one lower division course in the given subject or two years of college work.	200-299 Ordinarily open only to students who have completed at least 18 upper division units basic to the subject matter of the course.	300-399 Offered in Education and other departments, and are specifically designed for teachers or prospective teachers.	400-499 Other professional courses (acceptable toward academic degrees only within limitations prescribed by a college, school, or the Graduate Division).

Tuition and Fees

Summer Sessions assigns each course a certain number of units based on the workload it requires. For lecture or seminar courses, 1 unit = 1 hour of class per week + 2 hours of student work per week, with each course offering three to five units. The cost per unit can change each year. You can use the QR code below to find the most up to date tuition and fee information.

Course Materials and Service Fee

Specific classes, such as those with science or computer labs, photography labs, and art supplies, may have a course materials and service fee. This fee is non-refundable and should be noted at classes.berkeley.edu.

Summer tuition and fees must be paid in full within seven calendar days after enrollment, or you will be dropped from your class(es).



International Student Requirements

Full-Time Student Status



All international students traveling to Berkeley should enroll full-time and obtain the appropriate student visa status for study. International students with an F-1 I-20 certificate of eligibility document issued by UC Berkeley must be enrolled full time for the entire summer session period noted on your I-20. Full-time student status varies depending on what session(s) you enroll in and does not apply for students taking online classes.

Visa and Immigration

International students coming to the United States from abroad with the primary intention of study should normally obtain F-1 visa status. Students who wish to attend in J-1 visa status should contact the Summer Sessions office. To apply for an F-1 visa at a U.S. Embassy or Consulate in your country, request an F-1 I-20 document. After you enroll in courses, you will be invited to apply for your F-1 I-20 via our International Student Service (ISS) Portal.

International students coming from abroad are required to have valid visas in their passports to enter the United States (Canadian citizens do not need visas, but do need the I-20 for entry in student status).

English Proficiency Requirement

If you are from a country in which the official language is not English, you must meet the English Proficiency Requirement regardless of citizenship, unless one of the following items applies:

- You are from a country exempt from the English Proficiency Requirement
- You enroll exclusively in Summer English Language Studies courses
- Your university has been granted an exemption based on an affiliation agreement

Health Insurance

Medical care in the United States can be very expensive and health insurance coverage is required to meet unexpected expenses. If you are coming to Berkeley, you should purchase a health insurance policy before you arrive in the United States. Your policy should:

- cover all medical and hospital costs
- provide a minimum of \$50,000 for each accident or illness
- include a deductible of \$500 or less for each accident or illness
- cover at least 75% of hospital and physician costs from the time you leave your current residence to the day you plan to return

Housing



University Housing: Residence Halls & Apartments

University Housing has many options available that provide convenience and safety for students, fostering an environment for success that you can't find off-campus.

Residence Halls include shared lounges and communal bathrooms with all-gender and single-gender floors. Apartments are single-gender and share a bathroom, kitchen, and living room. Residential Life staff provide activities, wellness programs, and social outings to ensure a successful and fulfilling summer.

International House (I-House) offers a once-in-a-lifetime intercultural living opportunity. Located in the foothills of the Berkeley campus, I-House is a historic campus housing facility and intercultural program center for U.S. and international students.

- Join a global community that supports your academic pursuits, promotes career development, and encourages mentorship networking
- Live with a diverse group of graduate students, laboratory researchers, visiting scholars, and exchange students from around the world
- Enjoy fantastic bay views and convenient access to campus, the Law School, Cal Memorial Stadium, and the Berkeley hills

There are spaces for work and recreation, including a library, lounges, game rooms, and music studios. Conference rooms and a small kitchen are available for residents' special events.
